Teachers Information:

For this activity the students will practice using a specific point of view.

Objectives:

- The student will participate in a discussion on point of view.
- The student will read and discuss a story illustrating point of view.
- The student will write a story, first choosing the point of view.

Materials:

This lesson requires only a class set of the story "On Thin Ice" and writing materials.

Procedure:

1. Discuss how point of view changes the facts of an event entirely. Some movies that have capitalized on point of view are "A Bug's Life" and "Toy Story." Talk about how even a person's point of view "changes the story."
